Course Description:

Government deals with the issues and problems confronting all Americans in today's society. Students will examine the structures and purposes of national, state and local governments. They will also examine the issues facing the United States both domestically and internationally. An emphasis is placed on the rights and responsibilities of individual citizens within our nation, and a broader examination of human rights throughout the world.
