Electronic Music 2012-2013

Course Description:

Ever wonder about the process of creating a CD, or about composing today's current music, or about today's music industry? Then, this is the course for you. Students involved in this course will learn to use the latest software available from the music industries such as GarageBand, Finale, iTunes, etc. A project based course, students will use synthesizers and computers to create, publish, and record music. Students will learn basic keyboard function, sequencing, tracking, and recording skills. Students will also look at every aspect of the music industry including such topics as law and marketing

Course Content:

Composing and Scoring for small ensembles

Composing and Scoring for larger ensembles

Musical terminology

Music History as related to keyboard instruments and famous composers and/or performers Sequencing and mastering of recorded music

Composition in popular styles such as Blues, Rock and Roll, etc.
