Theatre I 2012-2013

Course Description:

This is an introductory course to the dramatic and theatrical arts. Students will explore the theatre as actors and directors. The focus of THEATRE I is on the skills of acting and directing. Students will experience the aspects of improvisational acting as well as rehearsed acting. Acting techniques and scene exploration will be explored. Students will be performing memorized, scripted monologues and scenes as well as monologues and scenes that they create themselves. Concentration, observations, and believability will be the skills targeted. Students will be able to use the terms and phrases that are used in professionally theatre productions. Students will be exposed to the origins of theatre as well as the elements of acting by reading, dramatic literature. This is an active class that includes theatre games, memorization, and public speaking as well as tests and projects.
