
## Curriculum Newsletter - 3/20/15

**NEWSELA** - <u>www.newsela.com</u> - this is a very exciting website and can be used by all middle and high school teachers. I received such a positive response from groups of teachers who were using NEWSELA in their classroom that the district purchased the "Pro" version for your use. You can change lexile levels, have students take an on-line quiz and keep track of student work in their system. There is a huge selection of non-fiction articles that align to all curriculum. Use your TDA training to have students write an on-line response to an article. **Exciting**!!! **Enjoy**!!!

**Close Reading/TDA** - groups of teachers at the IS and MS are completing training on how to design appropriate TDA (Text Dependent Analysis) questions. I've attended the trainings and found them to be valuable with time given to create and "take back to the classroom."
