In addition, the counseling department's mission is to provide support to all students regarding the development of social and interpersonal skills that will allow students to function to their fullest potential in a global society.

Students will benefit by being exposed to and exploring careers through interest surveys, researching the career market, participating in career days, meeting and interviewing individuals from varying careers, job shadowing, volunteer work and internships. Students will also participate in lessons and programs delivered by the counseling department and teachers on various academic, career and social/emotional related topics. Students can help other students through peer tutoring, peer mediation, peer mentoring, and teen counseling programs. Students should take ownership of their academic, career, and social/emotional growth.

Parents

Southern Lehigh encourages parent support and involvement in all aspects of their child's K-12 academic career. Parents are an integral part of the education team regarding academic placement, interventions and student educational decisions. Parents have the opportunity to meet with their child's counselor or teachers at any time upon request and can refer their child to the Guidance Office for support. Parent programs are offered at all levels on a variety of topics relating to career, academic and social/emotional concerns. Parents often provide feedback on parent programs through evaluations or surveys. Our student management system parent portal, as well as our school district website, is available for parents to access and be informed on district news and information related to their child's academic performance and expectations.

Educators

The Southern Lehigh Educators will assist to manage and implement a comprehensive school counseling program throughout the district to best develop global learners. In the career and technology classes, students complete career inventories, resumes and a graduation project that involves job shadowing, a research paper, and a culminating student presentation in front of a panel of teachers. The Health and Family Consumer Science curriculums address various student health and well-being topics, including drug awareness, conflict resolution, cyber-bullying, stress management and social skills.

11. Individualized Academic/Career Plan:

Career planning begins in grade 4 with an introduction to careers. In grades 5 and 6, students continue to explore careers and potential pathways, helping them to find their "spark". Continuing in 8th grade, all students will develop a career portfolio in their Career and Technical Exploration class. The portfolio will consist of a career interest search, a sample job application, a

resume, cover letter, thank you letter, and ratings from their mock interview during career day. Students will create both an electronic copy and hard copy of their portfolio. The hard copy of their portfolio will follow them to the High School. In 10th grade students will revisit their career portfolio in their Careers and Technology Applications class. During this class, students will work on their graduation project that will encompass job shadowing and creating business and career-related documents and products.

13. **Job Description:**

Function of Position: Provides the necessary school counseling at the intermediate through high school levels in the areas of individual and group counseling; staff and student orientation; test preparation administration and interpretation; information maintenance and dissemination; and cooperation with staff, administration and the community.

Reporting Relationships: Reports directly to the Building Principal and to the Director of Special Education. Provides communication as required concerning the achievement of objectives, summary of activities, and other matters relating to the function of the school counselor.

Duties and Responsibilities:

- 1. Counsel individually and/or with selected groups of students.
- 2. Consult with staff and parents on issues concerning individual student needs.
- 3. Refer to outside agencies when appropriate.
- 4. Provide orientation activities for students and parents throughout the high school program.
- 5. Administer and interpret standardized achievement instruments.
- 6. Counsel students to prepare and maintain a plan to reach their postsecondary goals.
- 7. Maintain, secure and disseminate pupil records in accordance with district, state and federal policy and regulation.
- 8. Provide students and their families with information relevant to postsecondary experiences.
- 9. Facilitate career exploration and decision making through a variety of methods.
- 10. Utilize a variety of media sources to maintain communication with the school and community.
- 11. Serve as a member of the Student Assistance Team.
- 12. Assist the administration in the resolving conflicts in the Master Schedule as they relate to individual student schedules.
- 13. Participate in crisis intervention.
- 14. Pursue opportunities for professional development and enhance counseling skills.
- 15. Initiate the referral process for students with exceptional needs.
- 16. Assist students in developing an awareness of self and acceptance of others.

Education, Experience, Special Skills, or Training:

Master's degree in Counselor Education from an accredited institution of higher education.

Pennsylvania certification in guidance at the elementary and/or secondary level.
