Course Description:

Students will practice and refine basic skills in a variety of oral communication-oriented activities such as taped selections from native speakers and films in French. French culture will be examined in depth. Classes are conducted primarily in French. Course content includes grammar review, oral communication and reading of short stories and literary excerpts.
